1939 Oatley Castle: Reminder of the War Days
IN THE PROPELLOR 18 May 1939 page 7 column 5

This article is unsigned, gives only approximate dates and does not name the "eccentric, wealthy owner". It does locate the "Castle", "facing the junction of the George's and Woronora Rivers and overlooking Como Bridge". The article says; "Soon to be demolished to make way for less romantic modern bungalows" so presumably the walls were still standing in 1939. The article says the stone was quarried on site and that the "timber roof members" came from an old theatre (not named) and transported to Oatley; the plans for building were altered continually with portions of the building being demolished and reconstructed. The author claims that the owner wanted to build a fort to combat the Germans, who presumably were to invade Australia via Georges River (during the 1914-1918 War.) He claims there was a small weatherboard room built in the quarry, with access via a plank, to give the owner privacy and security. He concludes "The Warended long before the building was 'under way' but for over six years after the War, the work was carried on. (This would mean building was going on in 1924.) He comments that swagmen used the Castle, so damage was taking place.

On the point above Neverfail Bay a large stone mansion was built for Mr. Silvester of Silvester Smallgoods, but this was later abandoned and proved a good playground for a generation of Oatley children. Over the years as the stones gradually disappeared the legends about Silvester's Castle blossomed with wildflower profusion. To some Silvester was a spy who built his fortress like some castle on the Rhine to aid the Kaiser; to others he was a philanthropist preparing to shelter all the people of Oatley when the invasion came. Are these memories relics of the childrens' games? Such memories are still vivid now and very real to those who remember childhood days when Oatley boys and girls scrambled on the crumbling turret high above the glistening river and the lattice girders of the railway bridge.

SYLVESTER'S CASTLE

Another interesting event at Gungah Bay was the building of Sylvester's Castle in Yarran Road, at the

corner of Southern Street. Mr. Sylvester of the well-known small goods shops in Sydney, was going to have his home built in a beautiful position, with commanding views of the river. The stone was cut by stonemasons on the site but as the property was so far away from where they lived, stonemasons did not stay for long. To get to the job they would have to take the train to Como and walk back across the bridge to Sylvesters. The work therefore proceeded erratically. Mr. Sylvester was considered to be an eccentric and there were many theories about the purpose of the house, such as an asylum for the mental or as a spy's lookout in case an enemy force came up Georges River and landed troops to take Sydney from the rear. The building never reached roof height as parts were built, demolished and re-erected to a different plan. Beneath there were tunnels and cellars and water tanks built like rooms. To the children of Oatley, the castle was a marvellous playground, for there were so many exciting nooks and crannies to explore. The stone was cut from the centre to form a quarry and the castle built around this. In this quarry was a weatherboard cottage, built on concrete piles. the only access by a plank across the ten feet drop of the quarry. This cottage contained papers and photos, a table and a red cedar chair. The children would swing around on this, for the door of the cottage was not locked, and Mr. Sylvester was only there when the stonemasons were working. In the mid-1920s, the inevitable happened, for one Saturday afternoon, a fire destroyed the wooden cottage, and the firemen and all the children of the district were in attendance. The project was now abandoned, the Castle fell into disrepair, and the stones were scattered to the winds, some to reappear as foundations of houses and neat stone fences within the vicinity. N.B. SILVESTER'S CASTLE

Until recently, at the end of Yarran Road — the point of land between Neverfail Bay and Gungah Bay — were the remains of "Silvester's Castle". There are many rumours about this building, but one of the most persistent is that Mr. Silvester was on remittance from his family — the Silvester smallgoods people. There were those who believed that Silvester's ideas were "different" from most people's. In any case, during World War I, Silvester formed the opinion that the Germans would come up the Georges River and attack Oatley, so he began to build a castle with turrets, armouries, dungeons and so forth. The castle was never completed and in fact what there was of it seems to have been poorly constructed. Now that the castle has gone, there are many stone fences in the vicinity.

In Oatley, at a point of land at the end of Yarran Road between Neverfail Bay and Gungah Bay, Silvester's Castle was built. Stories

abounded about the building including a version that Silvester was a remittance man separated from his family, the Silvesters of smallgoods fame. However, Silvester, during World War I, believed the Germans might invade and sail up the Georges River to attack Oatley. To defend the area he planned a castle with turrets, armouries and dungeons. The castle, poorly constructed, was never completed and subsequently many of the stones ended up in the front fences of homes in the area.

Mr Tamplin remembers walls two storeys high in 1935, was told a fire destroyed buildings in 1917 and the ruins vandalised after 1945.

"The Castle was surrounded with a beautiful stone wall which was extracted from the sand stone on the property. The sand stone wall ran down the steep sandy rocky hill to the George's River, a length of about 600 to 800 feet about 2 feet wide and beautifully made."

FACTS

So much for the stories. Now for some facts.

THE MAN

Henry Crawford Silvester was the son of William and Ann Silvester. He died on 27 November 1935. (BDM Index Death 1935 no 19795)

His death was reported in the SMH 28 November 1935 P 10 col. 1

DEATHS

Nov. 27, 1935 at a private hospital, Darlinghurst, Henry Crawford Silvester of Silvester Bros Ltd aged 73 years

OBITUARY

HENRY CRAWFORD SILVESTER

The death took place yesterday of Mr Henry Crawford Silvester, one of the founders of the firm of Silvester Bros Ltd, small goods manufacturers, of Regent Street, Redfern. Mr Silvester was 71 years of age and had been ill for six months. He was born in Kent and was one of the youngest of a large family. He lost his father at an early age, and as a youth, worked his passage to New Zealand, where he joined his brother, William, at Lake Wanaka. After a few years in N.Z., he came to Sydney about 1890, and with his brother, established the firm of Silvester Bros. The business was successful from the outset and branches were established at the Central Railway Station and in the Strand Arcade. His brother, William, died in 1927. Mr Henry Crawford Silvester was a bachelor and is survived by one sister in Sydney, his other surviving brothers and sisters living abroad.

Note his age is given as 71, not 73 as in the death notice.

A report of his funeral appears in SMH 29 November 1935 p 8 col.e

"The funeral of Mr. Henry Crawford Silvester took place yesterday at the

Church of England Cemetery, Woronora.

The chief mourners were Mrs E.E. Silvester (sister-in-law) and Mr A.Randall (brother-in-law)
Silvester Bros were represented by Messrs V.H. Silvester, S.E.Blake, K.E.Silvester and K.W.Silvester (directors), K.T.English (secretary), R. Granger ... and L.Silvester. Others present included (representatives of other firms)... Mesdames V.H.Silvester and others.

(The SMH microfilm was so unclear that I am not sure of some of the initials.)

This should dispel the story that Silvester was a German, settle the spelling of the name as SILVESTER, not Sylvester, and cast doubt on the assumption that he was a remittance man.

SILVESTER'S WILL

The Probate Index 1929-1938 shows two reference numbers, 213734 and 221490, gives the date of death as 27 November 1935, his residence as Sydney, with a note, Pendente lite, the Latin phrase for "law suit is pending." Mr Arthur Ellis, of Hurstville Historical Society kindly made available a photocopy of the will for me to examine.

WILL 221490 Arthur Randall of Epping, brother-in-law, small goodsman, and Sydney Stansell Blake, accountant, were appointed as his trustees.

He left his estate to be shared equally between his brothers and sisters:

George Silvester, Grays Inn, pilot Edward Silvester South Africa Kate Silvester South Africa Ellen Rendell wife of Arthur Rendell. (sic)

Should anyone die before him, their share was to go to their children.

There was a provision that disposal of his assets was not to embarrass or prejudice Silvester Bros.

The will was drawn 9 December 1927. He died in 1935. Probate was granted to Arthur Randall and Sydney Stansell Blake 24 May 1937.

His estate realised £80,338.

I doubt that he was a remittance man with such assets.

HIS PLACE OF RESIDENCE

From 1907 to 1921 he lived at "Nymboida", a house on the east side of Rosa Street, between Neville and Frederick Streets. (Sands Directories of Sydney)

In 1921 the Hurstville Council Rate Books have an address for rates to be sent to William Bates at 55 St David's Road, Haberfield. Wm Bates and his wife attended Sivester's funeral, so he must have been a friend or business associate.

I could not find him in Sands Directory from 1922 to 1924, but in 1924, the rate notices were sent to his accountant, S. E. Blake.

From 1925 to 1928, he lived at 14 Ada Street, Oatley.

Sometimes Sands Directory has J. Silvester, not H. Silvester, but the Electoral Rolls prove he lived in Ada Street.

I could not find him in 1929, but in 1930 he moved to 29 Turner Avenue, Haberfield where he was still living in 1933, the last Sands Directory published. He died in 1935.

PROFESSION

The Electoral Rolls from 1909 to 1928, show Henry Crawford Silvester as a butcher from 1909 to 1922 living at Rosa Street, and until 1928, as retired and living at 14 Ada Street, Oatley.

Deeds in the Land Titles Office, when he bought land in Yarran Road, show Provision Merchant.

LAND HELD IN OATLEY

While H.C.Silvester was living in Oatley, he bought several blocks of land across the railway line, in that part of Oatley which is in the Municipality of Hurstville.

Rate Notices issued in December 1923 show his holdings:

He paid a total amount of £ 36/6/9 in rates that year.

See Deposit Plan DP5510 which shows Henry Crawford Silvester's holdings. Section 27 Waratah Street is not shown on this map. See also photocopy of a subdivision map of the Oatley Estate, with lots marked. (From the collection in "Gladwyn")

This estate was originally part of the 300 acres granted to James Oatley on 31 August 1833. It then passed to Charles Cecil Griffiths on 21 March 1884. He sold it as Oatley's Estate Co Ltd

PERTINENT LAND

It is the three lots in Section 29 Lots 1,2 and 3 that concern our search, for it is on these lots that the stone buildings, known as Silvester's Castle stood.

An area of 1 acre 2 roods was purchased by Herman Philip Henry Jasper Goth. This was Lots 1 and 2 of Section 29. He left it to his widow and sister. It was then sold to Henry Crawford Silvester, gentleman, on 9 December 1912. (Certificate of Title Reg. Book 1980 Folio 135)

I have not sighted the title deed for Lot 3 section 29 but was told by Mr Arthur Ellis that it was purchased in 1909.

This Lot 3 now has a house whose address is No 5, Southern Street, and the owner provided vital information.

Lot 1 Section 29 is on the corner of Southern Street and Yarran Road and Lots 2 and 3 in Southern Street, the land running down to Georges River.

The dimensions of Lots 1, 2 and 3 varied. Each had a frontage of 66 feet, but the length, running down to the water line, was approximately 627 feet for Lot 1, 547 feet for Lot 2 and 415 feet for Lot 3.

The 1912-1914 Valuation Book shows that Lots 1 and 2 (billed together) had a weatherboard house of five rooms on it and was therefore rated more highly. Lot 3 shows a value for land only, with no building. In the period 1912-1914, Silvester paid rates of £3/6/8 for Lot 1 on an UCV of £200, rates of £1/10/0 for Lot 2 with an UCV of £90 and rates of £2/0/0 for Lot 3 with an UCV of £120.

In 1920-1922 Lots 1 and 2 had an UCV of £264 and an ICV of £600, where Lot 3 had a value of £132 for land only.

The Valuation Lists for 1926 show for Lots 1,2 and 3, an improvement of "stone walls, etc". No improvements are shown on his other holdings in Southern Street, Lots 4 and 9 of Section 29.

This is the only written evidence I have found for the existence of the Castle. Unfortunately this does not help in establishing the date that Silvester began his building.

I do have a report of the state of building in 1928, supplied by Mr Laurie Meakin of 5, Southern Street, Oatley, i.e Lot 3.

Mr Meakin has provided a map and states that the main building, with a tower was "approximately 50 feet from Southern Street and on the Yarran Road boundary. It was of a 2-storey construction with an additional cellar constructed mainly of fine stone. However some concrete interior columns were used and at the southern end on top of the building, was a concrete water tank.

The other main buildings were about 120 feet down Southern Street and approximately 50 feet from the street and another near the north-western corner of the block.

These buildings both lacked roofs, however most of the walls were still in reasonable condition. They were both single storey. Both had been badly gutted by fire."

FIRE

Everyone remembers the effects of a fire on the ruins. However, no one knows when it happens. Mr George Tamplin states 1917; Dr Hatton was told "the mid-1920"s. There is an index to the local newspapers at "Gladwyn", for the St George Call from 1904-1979 and The Propellor for 1911-1942. No fire in the area is reported. There is a gap in the indexes of the SMH for the period.

I cannot therefore find any record of the fire which destroyed the Castle.

PHOTOGRAPHS

Mrs Snoor of Waratah Street, Oatley presented an album of photographs of Silvester's Castle taken 24 March 1927 to the Hurstville Historical Society, who have deposi ted it with "Gladwyn". Their reference is Neg. 3 Film MN and others, and show the Castle with cellar, another building and some walls, with doorways but no roof.

A copy of Neg. 3 Film MN is included.

CONCLUSION

I have presented, as promised, the written records I found on Silvester's Castle. Henry Crawford Silvester has been identified and something of his life revealed. The position of his "Castle" has been established, but I am sure you will agree, there is so much more we would like to know that must remain mere speculation.

ADDITIONAL MATERIAL NOT STRICTLY RELEVANTTO THE CASTLE

THE BUSINESS

SILVESTER BROS Provision Merchants, Poulterers, Pork Butchers, etc and Small goods manufacturers 71 Regent St Redfern

This advertisement appeared year after year in Sands Directory. Other addresses in the City and suburbs appear but this was the main building. It was demolished about February 1997. (per Arthur Ellis)

WILLIAM SILVESTER

According to Henry's obituary, William was his older brother. I did not find a death notice in NSW in 1927 that corresponded. William C Silvester died in 1927 at Burwood (15107), but his parents were Frederick and Susan, not William and Ann as Henry.

In the Probate Index for 1927, I found William Craggs Silvester, who died at Homebush 27 September 1927 No 148973. I have not sighted this will, so cannot be sureif he is the same man whose death was reported, or that he is Henry's older brother.

OTHER SILVESTERS

Mrs E.E. Silvester, Henry's sister-in-law, was Elizabeth Ellen of 7 Culdees Road, Enfield. Her son, Eric William, student, lived with her. (Electoral Roll 1934 Parkes - Croydon Park 5539 and 5540) Eric William must be 21 to be on the Electoral Roll, and is probably the Director, whose initials I could not be sure of from an indistinct microfilm of the SMH - K.? W.

The Director, V.H. Silvester was Vernon Henry Silvester, director, of "Sunnyside", York Street, Belmore. (Electoral Roll 1934 Electorate of Lang Subdivision of Belmore 6079)

He married Annie May Eleanor Philpot of Canterbury in 1913. They had two children, Norman L. born 1914 at Burwood and Margaret E. born 1917 at Burwood (BDM Register)

I have not established any relationship between the following Silvesters listed in Sands Directory for 1933:

Alfred Charles Silvester 18 The Mall, Hurstville manufacturer (Electoral Roll Division of Barton subdivision of Kogarah 14494)

Horace Edward Silvester 33 Forbes Street, Ashbury (Electoral Roll Parkes subdivision Ashbury but which gives his address as Croydon Park) motor mechanic

NOTES ON OTHER LAND HELD BY H.C.SILVESTER

It is interesting to note that in the 1912 Rate Books, Silvester's name is incorrectly given as H.C.Sylvester of Rosa Street, Oatley and is corrected by the 1917 voume.

Regarding Lots 1, 2-10 of Section 32, in Yarran Road, a note against Lot 1 states,

"This land is unapproachable, being on a slope, the value being more than 2034/2035", which are the other lots. Photocopy herewith. From Rate Book 1912-14

Regarding Lot 4 of Section 29, in Southern Street, it was purchased by H.C.Silvester on 7 May 1921 for £180. Hurstville Transfer Book 1921 photocopy herewith

Regarding Lot 9 of Section 29 in Southern Street, Lots 6 and 7 of Section 30 in Llewellyn Street and Lots 67 and 68 of Section 31 in Waratah Street and Lots 1-10, 16-22 and 26 of Section 32 in Yarran Road, these were sold after H.C Silvester's death, by his executors, S.S.Blake and A. Randall on 31 March 1938. Certificate of Title Vol. 2354 Folio 172. Photocopy herewith

JUDGMENT £80,000 WILL

WHEN Henry Crauford Silvester made his will, he was of sound mind, said Mr. Justice Nicholas, in the Probate Court to-day.

The scheme of the will was perfectly rational, and there was strong evidence that it was made by a competent testator, said the Judge, in admitting the will to probate.

Mr. Justice Nicholas's reserved fudgment was in the application by Arthur Randall and Henry Stansell Blake, executors, for the admitting

Blake, executors, for the admitting
to probate of Silvester's £80,000 estate. Defendant in the action was
Vernon Henry Silvester, hephew, who
lodged a caveat against the estate
alleging festamentary incapacity by
Silvester when he made his will.
Dealing with lunacy proceedings
before Sir John Harvey some years
ago, the indge said he should still
hold that Silvester's answers read in
the light of Sir John Harvey's comment, furnished the strongest indication of Silvester's testamentary
capacity.

The children of Silvester's then deceased brothers and sisters, with a few
exceptions, were unknown to him
personally and he might well have
thought himself justified in excluding
the children of his deceased brother.
William Crage Silvester, on the two
grounds that he had initiated proceedings in lunacy against the
testator, which the son, the present
defendant, had continued.

"It is clear that he had no general
education and that even after he left
the business, he read no books. His
recreation was physical exercise,
usually without any definite plan,"
said the judge.

"He never married and he never
attempted to attain the social position or to enjoy the comforts commensurate with his wealth.


There was no doubt that the behavior of Silveste was abnormal and eccentric, and that in 1928, he appeared to be older than his 64 years. "I think the festator's carelessness in money matters, as instanced by his neglect to bank large cheques, while living in extreme discomfort, and his neglect to complete building or drainage schemes which he had begun were both instances of the same mental condition.

"He never accistomed himself to the handling of money and he would not brace his maind to the mental affort necessary for decisions or action.

"Sir John Harvey had refused hem.


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
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

Nancy Hirt: Our house is all standing on stone from Silvester Castle. My Dad used to push a barrow up every day. We had a heck of a day doing that until all the stones were brought down. Dad paid \$5 for the block in about 1928. He was in the navy.

Voice: Was the castle built during the war - 1917?

Nancy: During the war! There were several severe fires, there was no hope of putting them out. The water was on Silvester land. We used to catch huge tadpoles in the water. It was 8 mthsafter that we built a Hudson Ready Built home there.

(Sam Pavey had previously stated there was s spring on the land.)

Russ G: Ann, is spring still there?

Ann No.

Russ G.: Would you like to say something?

Ann M.: Walls are very visible on the block. I can look at the wall straight out of my front door. Side fences are the same. Number 1 goes right through to Yarran Road. We have found slate and broken glass around. If anyone would like to come and have a look, we can make a day.

Russ G.: It IS spelt with an "I" so that's correct.

Voice: It could have been a trade name.

SILVESTER AND HIS CASTLE

HIS ADA STREET RESIDENCE

Presented to The Oatley Heritage Group Friday 23 May 1997

"Oatley, The Working Mans Paradise," by Elaine Howard and "Oatley In The Early Days", by Dr. D. J. Hatton have both touched on the subject of Silvester's Castle at the corner of Yarran Road and Southern Street. Joan Hatton detailed the structure of the building, the fire in the mid twenties and how the stones disappeared over the years. She also touched on an interesting point that he was an eccentric man.

This eccentricity can be born out by two of our local citizens, Ray Stevens and Jim Nicholson who lived in Ada Street when Mr. Silvester was in residence at number fourteen. Both gentlemen tell similar stories of Mr. Silvester buying large quantities of goods at auction and having the items stored on his adjacent blocks of ground. Telephone booths were the first item both men could recall, hand basins, old wooden cable drums, you name it he would have them stored in Ada Street. A treasure trove for children of the street to explore.

Ray recalls an old Sea Chest housed on the front verandah of Silvester's house. This intrigued Ray over the years, eventually he plucked up the courage went in one day and opened it. Inside he found old English journals describing the forthcoming journey that Lieutenant Cook was about to undertake to the Southern Continent Interesting reading, yet the historical value meant nothing to Ray. He was more worried at the time about encountering the caretaker who always seemed to sense when the lads of the street were raiding the locust tree or hunting through anything they shouldn't be doing. This was all happening in the mid nineteen thirties.

His house had the familiar "Silvester Castle" sandstone foundation and fence. It is pleasing to see the present owners Lois and Jim Vickery have maintained the house in its original state.

Tom and Jessie Booth acquired the block of ground number 12 which was part of the old Silvester property. When they were clearing the ground in the early Nineteen Fifties in preparation to build their house, the old shed down the back had some useless papers in it. They together with anything else were promptly burnt. If only those ashes could talk today.

Ray also recalls rails being laid from Ada Street down into the property to remove the years of accumulated treasures after everything was auctioned. The ground was too soft for trucks to remove the goods, everything was hauled up to the road by trolley.

The residence at number 14 lay idle for years after Mr. Silvester moved to a family retreat especially catering for his extreme eccentricity before passing away. Two women, the wife of one of Oatley's prominent butchers, Mark Buttle and his daughter Lettie, bought the property and rented it for many years before the Vickerys became part of our community.

The other main buildings were about 120 ft down Southern St. v approx. 50 ft. from the Street of another near the north western Corner of the block. These buildings both lacked roofs, however most of the walls were still in Keasonable Condition. They were both Benigle Storey. Both had been badly gutted by fire.
