Dear Sire

I refer to your letter, dated 2nd March, 1959, reference B3797-32, in reply to a letter from Oatley West Parents' and Citizens' Association, dated 17th February, 1959, concerning the possibility of creeting an assembly hall at Oatley West Public School.

As a result of your letter, the Parents' and Citizens' Association, and the Mothers' Club, decided to set up a committee with roughly equal representation from each body, and with the headmaster (Mr. E.J. Bryant) as a member, ex officio, to handle what we term the Ontley West School Assembly Hall Project. An unsigned copy of our constitution is enclosed.

Our comments on the specific points and conditions mentioned in your letter ass as follows:

1. As required the committee mentioned above has been formed with Mr. A.B. Gilroy, 33 Douglas Haig Street, Ostley, as Chairmen, and the writer as Honorary Secretary. Preliminary discussions have already been carried out with Mr. A. K. Eedy as Architect. The Committee will undertake the necessary liaison with the builder and with the Department as well.

2. From whom are required the written guarantees assuming responsibility for construction costs as determined? From this Committee, from the parent organisations, or from all?

6. We agree to meet all costs associated with architect's fees, and the cost of plans and specifications.

5. It is not disputed that the siting of the assembly hall will be determined by the Department, but we think that the Department should give full consideration to any suggests that we may make on the matter.

We wish to thank you for your offer of assistance from the School Drama Section in regard to the design of the stage, and will bring the matter up in our discussions with the Architect.

Lastly, we wish to give formal advice to the Department that we would like to proceed with the construction of an assembly hall, and therefore request approval of the project. It is unlikely that we will be able to proceed with construction within a year, and ask that provision be made for funds during the 1961-1962 financial year.

I have been directed by the above Council to seek the active support of all Parents'& Citizens' Associations in the St. George District, in the work of the District Council.

There are upwards of 38 primary and secondary schools in this district, yet many of these schools are not represented on the Council.

Today there is a healthy growth of interest in the work of Parents' & Citizens' Associations in the major section of the St. George area, and there has also been considerable added interest in the activities of the Council. However, there is nothing like the full representation of Associations actively attending.

Many matters are engaging the attention of the Council which are of the utmost importance to your Association and to others in the district, e.g., the provision of adequate high school facilities to serve the district's needs, also the requirements of the primary schools themselves, and it is felt that your Association would have a valuable contribution to make to the discussion on such important matters.

Many successes have been achieved over the last couple of years through the efforts of your District Council, e.g., the Moorefield site was obtained by a very vigorous campaign waged by this Council. Today on that same site stands a very modern multi-purpose school which, quite possibly, may still have been in the planning stage had it not been for the efforts of this Council campaigning for its erection. Safety doors on trains originated here too, and to-day all new trains being built have safety doors. Five acres of ground, being reclaimed in the Kogarah Bay area, has been set aside as a playing field for school children. These are just a few of the efforts of your Council which affect every P. & C. Association.

If your Association is already represented we would welcome any representation you may care to submit through your delegates. If you are not represented, we suggest that at your next meeting you appoint two delegates to attend Council meetings which are held in the St. George County Council's rooms, Montgomery Street, Kogarah, at 8 pm., on the last Friday of each month.

#### EDUCATION AND THE STATE ELECTIONS.

Public Education in New South Wales is the responsibility of the NSW State Government, and thus the election of its Parliament is a matter of vital importance to Education.

The Federation has made appropriate representations to the political parties that they embody in their election policy that the Premier, in conjunction with the Premiers of other States, request the Federal Government for specific grants for Education, and that to determine the nature and extent of such grants a nation-wide enquiry be made into Primary, Secondary, and Technical Education in all States.

Replies have been received from the Parties, and are published in the February "Parent & Citizen".

Now it becomes the responsibility of each Association to approach the candidates of all parties in its electorate pressing them to support this policy.

During the Federal Elections in November 1958 a corresponding task was most satisfactorily performed, but on the occasion of the State Elections the opportunity to assist in the cause of Education is even more direct.

We therefore appeal to all Associations to approach all candidates for their support, and to do this in such a way as will win the good-will of the candidate. To do this it may be desirable for Associations to arrange a joint interview with each candidate with other organisations in the electorate, so that undue duplication of representation may be avoided.

Helpful information for use at such interviews is contained in the correspondence with the Premier, published in the February "Parent & Citizen", and in the Editorials of the November and February issues.

Never has there been a more significant occasion as now to fight for Education, and it is the responsibility of your Association no less than any other Association, to perform its part.

- (2) where the Insured by himself or his servants or agents has knowledge or has reasonable cause to suspect that facts or circumstances exist which amount to a breach of any condition or warranty as to absence of vice implied by law or which would in the absence of express agreement be
- (3) which the Insured whenever required so to do by the Company does not identify, and of which the Insured whenever required as aforesaid does not supply the name and address of the person from whom the Insured bought or acquired the same and of the person (if any) who to

THE COMPANY WILL ALSO PAY in connection with claims against the Insured to which the indemnity expressed by the policy applies or claims

All law costs and all charges and expenses incurred in the settlement or the defence of claims or litigation arising therefrom where such costs, to which if sustained such indemnity would applycharges and expenses are incurred by the Company or by the Insured with the written consent of the Company, and all law costs, charges

but so that any sum to which the liability of the Company is expressed to be limited as hereinafter provided shall be inclusive of all such costs, charges and expenses.

#### EXCLUSIONS

- (a) Claims for death, injury or damage arising directly or indirectly out of or caused by or in connection with any mechanically propelled machine or vehicle or attachment thereto in respect of which insurance under the Motor Vehicle (Third Party Insurance) Act 1942 or THE COMPANY SHALL NOT BE LIABLE for-
  - (b) Claims for death, injury or damage arising directly or indirectly out of or caused by or in connection with the erection, demolition, alteration of and/or addition to buildings, except an addition or alteration not exceeding in cost the sum of £500.
  - (c) Claims-
- (1) in respect of death of or bodily injury to any person arising out of or in the course of the employment of such person in the
- (2) by any person in the service of any Contractor or Sub-Contractor to the Insured or by any dependant of such person for payment under any Workers' or Workmen's Compensation Act or Ordinance.
  - (d) Claims for damage to property-
- (1) of the Insured or of any member of the family of the Insured ordinarily residing with the Insured,

  - (2) of any person in the service of the Insured arising out of the employment of such person, (3) in the physical or legal control of the Insured or of any member of his family ordinarily residing with the Insured.

  - (e) Claims for the costs of rectifying faulty workmanship to any goods or land or building or structure. (1) Claims for death, injury or damage arising during (unless it be proved by the Insured that such death, injury or damage was not occasioned thereby), or in consequence of-(f)

    - (2) Any consequence of war, invasion, act of foreign enemy, hostilities (whether war be declared or not), civil war, rebellion,
      - of any contract of indemnity which imposes upon the Insured a liability which the Insured would not otherwise have been revolution, insurrection or military or usurped power.
