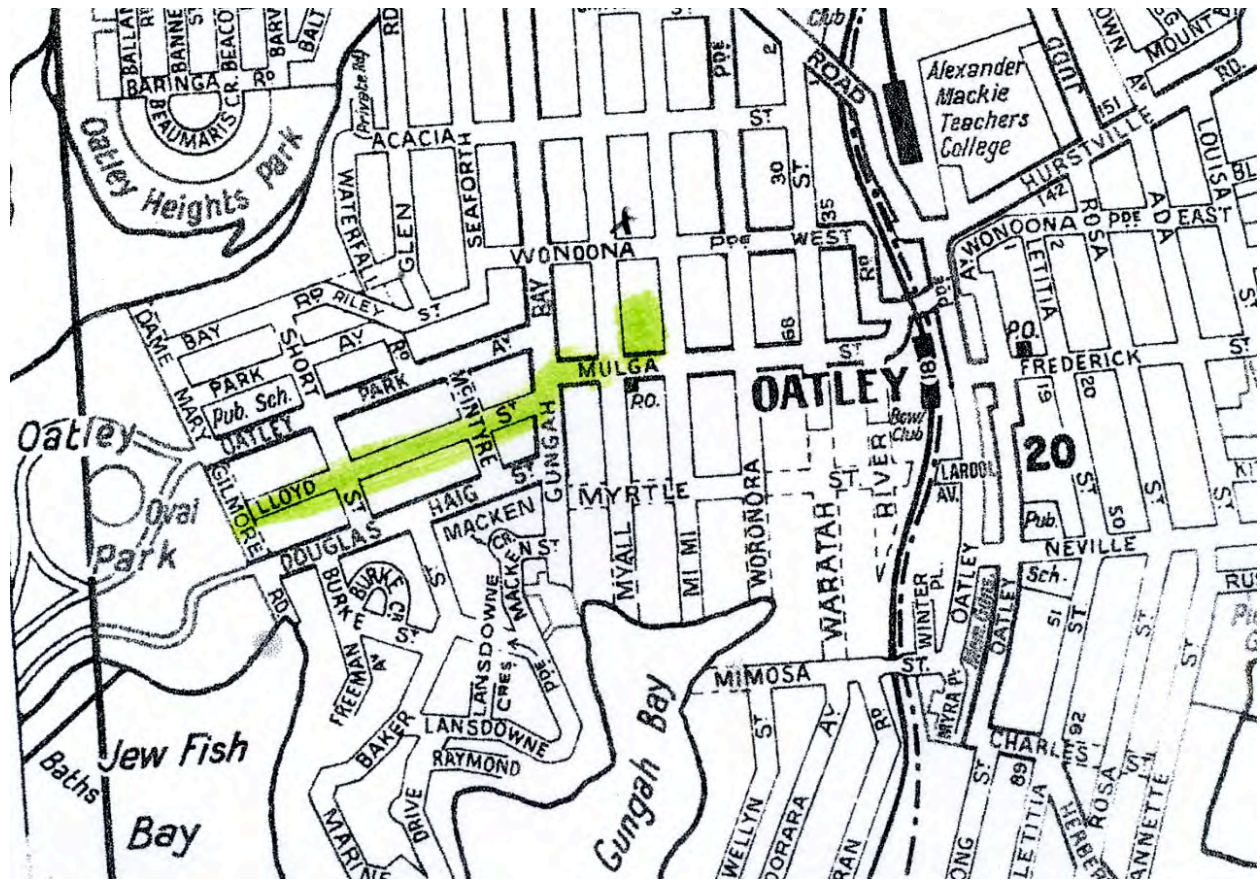

Oatley War Service Homes Lloyd Street

War Services Homes in West Oatley including Lloyd Street

I was asked to research the War Service Homes in Lloyd Street, West Oatley. (See Gregory's Street Directory of Sydney Map 38 45th ed 1981)

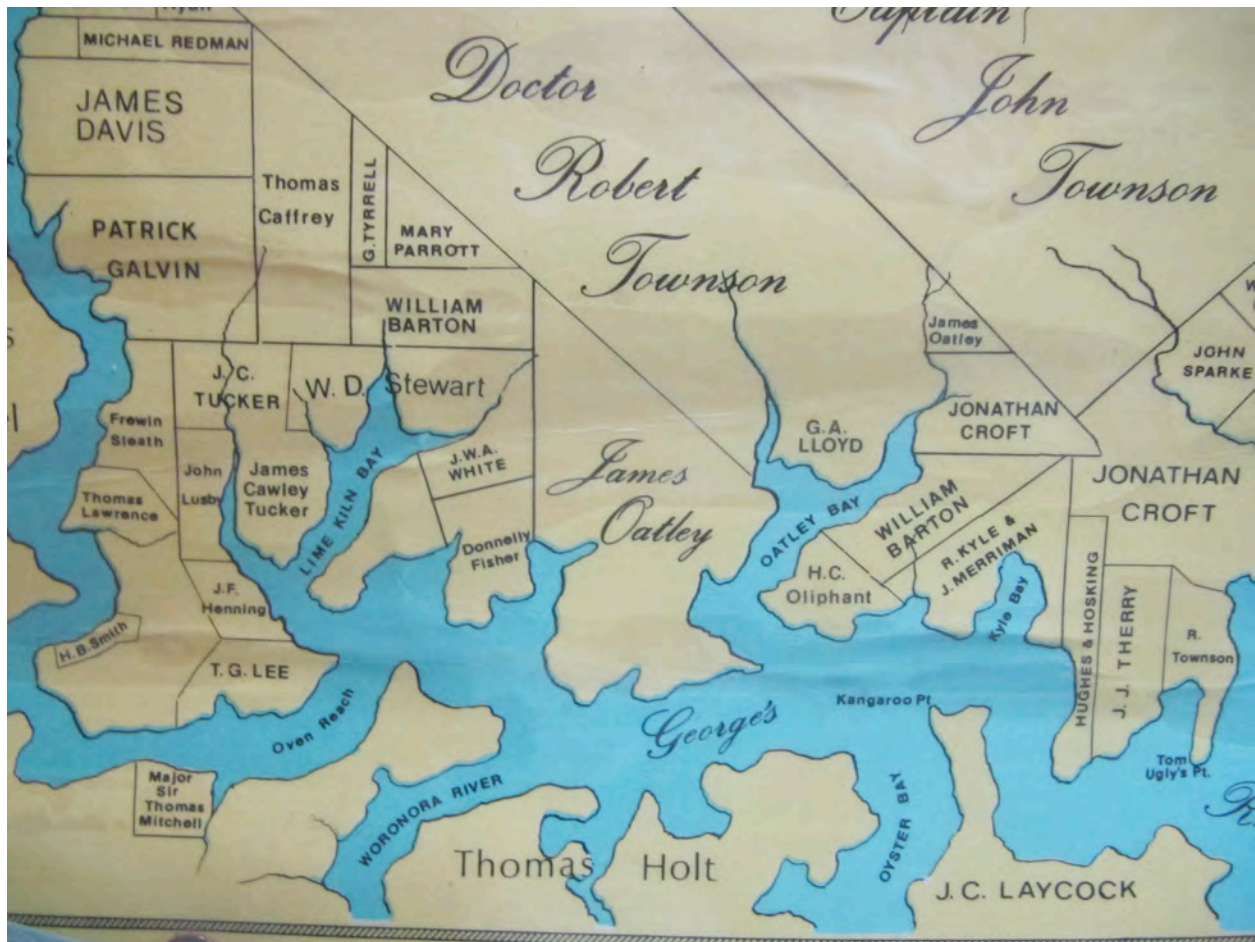


After a delightful afternoon exploring the street with Rodger Robertson, I began, as I usually do, by consulting the Map of the Parish St George in the County of Cumberland (4th ed) 1934, as it shows the first person to own the land.

PARISH MAP Australia inherited its method of land holding from English law which extends back to medieval times when the king owned all land and granted portions to his subjects. We still speak of Crown land. For administration the land was divided into counties; counties were divided into hundreds ; hundreds were divided into parishes. These parishes are not to be confused with church parishes although they often overlap. Governor Arthur Phillip named the County of Cumberland in 1788 and the Parish of St George was in use in 1823. (See KHS Newsletter November/December 2005 pp 3-4 The St George District by B. Goodger)

FIRST LAND GRANT It is such a cumbersome map, consisting of two sheets, each 106 x 69 cm., that I sometimes use Bryan Thomas' map from his book, The Original Colonial

Landholders of Sydney from 1792. (Published in 1982.) He simplifies an 1892 map It shows that the land which Lloyd Street traverses was granted to Donnelly Fisher in 1876. Although we continue to speak of land grants, after 1831 there was a purchase price to be paid.



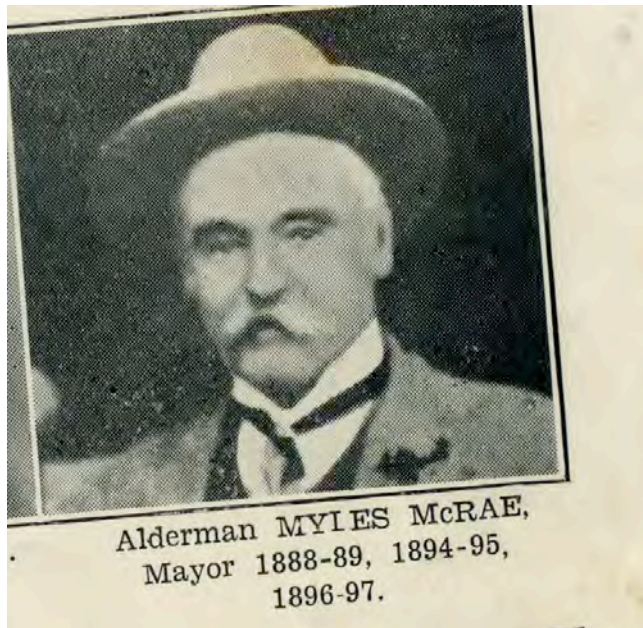
The date of 1876 for the grant is stated by Bryan Thomas in his book. But Fisher's grant, (275-246 Pt 46 of 94 hectares) is in a list of grants not dated in Geoff Cannon's work, The First Title Holders of Land in the County of Cumberland Vol 1 pp 229 et al Fisher also had land granted in the Parish of Gordon and several in the Parish of Mt Colah.

DONNELLY FISHER Donnelly Fisher (1850-1919) was a solicitor who lived at St Leonards and North Sydney. His mother was Thomasine Wentworth, so he was a grandson of William Charles Wentworth, the famous statesman and newspaper editor. He is buried in St Thomas' graveyard, North Sydney.

Fisher probably sold the land on and eventually it came into the possession of Myles McRae. He was perhaps the Alan Bond of his day. (Myles McRae 1845-1926 Mayor and alderman of Kogarah Council 1886-1897 and M.L.A. for Morpeth 1889-1891). He lived in the St George area at Bonnie Doon in Arncliffe and Kintail in Penshurst and deserves a full talk on his interesting and sometime scandalous life.)

MYLES McRAE Myles McRae started out as a produce merchant but was before long, a large scale land speculator along the Illawarra Line and owned much land in Oatley West. The portion we are looking at was offered for sale as Como Lakes Estate. I found an

advertisement in the SMH of 5 June 1918 calling for tenders for laying water pipes on the Como Lakes Estate. The Propeller of 5 December 1919 p.5 advertised Como Lakes' (sic) Estate for auction on Saturday 6 December 1919.

The subdivision plan of the Como Lakes Estate shows the area offered for sale divided into Lots 1-145.

THE NAME COMO LAKES ESTATE.

Why was it chosen? The real estate agents' hype urged buyers with the enticements that the Estate was only 11 miles from the City - the time from Central by express was only 27 minutes and by ordinary train only 44 minutes. - It was only 700 yards from Oatley Station and only 400 yards, by water, from Como Station. - it adjoins the fifth best park in the metropolis!

THE NAME OF THE STREETS.

Penshurst Park Avenue – because Oatley Park was called that at the time (1919)
 Lloyd George Street – obviously chosen to honour the wartime Prime Minister of England.
 Lloyd George lived from 1863 to 1945 and was MP for Caernarvon from 1890 to 1944. He was Prime Minister from 1916 to 1922. . He was made Earl of Dwyfor.

Lloyd George Street does not appear in Sands Directory of Sydney until 1923, indicating that no houses existed with householders to be listed before that date.

Hurstville Council shortened the name to Lloyd Street in July 1922. (HHS Newsletter Vol 3 no 65 January 1992 p.6)

Douglas Haig Street – to honour Douglas Haig, first Earl of Bermersyde, who lived from 1861 to 1928. He was the British Field –Marshall who led the offensive in France in August 1918. He had been the Commander-in-chief in France from 1915 to 1919.

Short Street The council Rate Book for 1919-1921 describes it as a dead end, so it had not yet been extended to Bay Street.

McIntyre Street I did not find any clues.

WAR SERVICE HOMES COMMISSION Now we come to the War Service Homes Commission. The War Service Homes Commission was set up soon after the Armistice when Senator E.D. Millen, Minister for Repatriation, introduced the Bill in December 1918, with the aim of providing homes for veterans and parents of deceased soldiers. The Act was passed in Dec. 1918. The commission came into force 6 March 1919. The Commission had the power to buy land and building materials and to provide a maximum payment of £700 (raised to £800 on 1920)

FIRST WAR SERVICE HOME

John Johnson, in his thesis "No Small Undertaking" (A very critical study of the War Service Homes Commission), states that Mr Denison Miller, the governor of the Commonwealth Bank, laid the foundation stone for the first War Service Home in Kennedy Avenue, Belmore on 21 July 1919. The Commonwealth Bank was intended to be part of the Scheme.

The house, at 32 Kennedy Avenue, Belmore was completed by September 1919 for Driver and Mrs Baxter. (Pictorial History of Canterbury/Bankstown, by Joan Lawrence 1999 p.75)
The Commission was interested in the Como Lakes Estate. The subdivision map shows the area divided into Lots 1-1345.

Their surveyor inspected and reported on 25/11/1919. He stated that the area was bush and recommended that they purchase Lots 51-59 on the north side of Lloyd George Street and Lots 90-99 on the South side. He noted that the shopping facilities were bad. There were no shops at Oatley. Penshurst was 3 minutes away by train.

PURCHASE OF LOTS IN LLOYD STREET

However, the subdivision plan for Como Lakes Estate for the auction sale on Saturday 6 December 1919 shows that the War Service Homes Commission purchased Lots 76-83 on the south side of Lloyd George Street from Gungah Bay Road to McIntyre Street (8 blocks) and lots 84 – 99 from McIntyre Street to Short Street. (16 blocks.)
(ML Z/SP/N13/1) and National Archives G46/5355 Group 45

PRICE OF LLOYD STREET BLOCKS The War Service Homes Commission bought those land blocks from Myles McRae for £1536/5/-. This was £1/10/- per foot. The total area was 4 acres 24 perches. (Title Vol 3100 Folio 187 Como Lakes Estate) There was a condition of confidentiality in not revealing his name. (National Archives SP859/1 G46/5355)

FIRST EX-SERVICEMEN TO BUY LAND

To find out when the first War Services Home was built, I began with Hurstville Council's Rate and Valuation Books. Names from 1919-1921, 1921-1923, 1923-1926 are included. In the Rate Book for 1919 – 1922 (Microfilm.Reel 23) people paying rates and giving their address as Lloyd George St were :

So 14 veterans had taken up land but no houses were yet built.

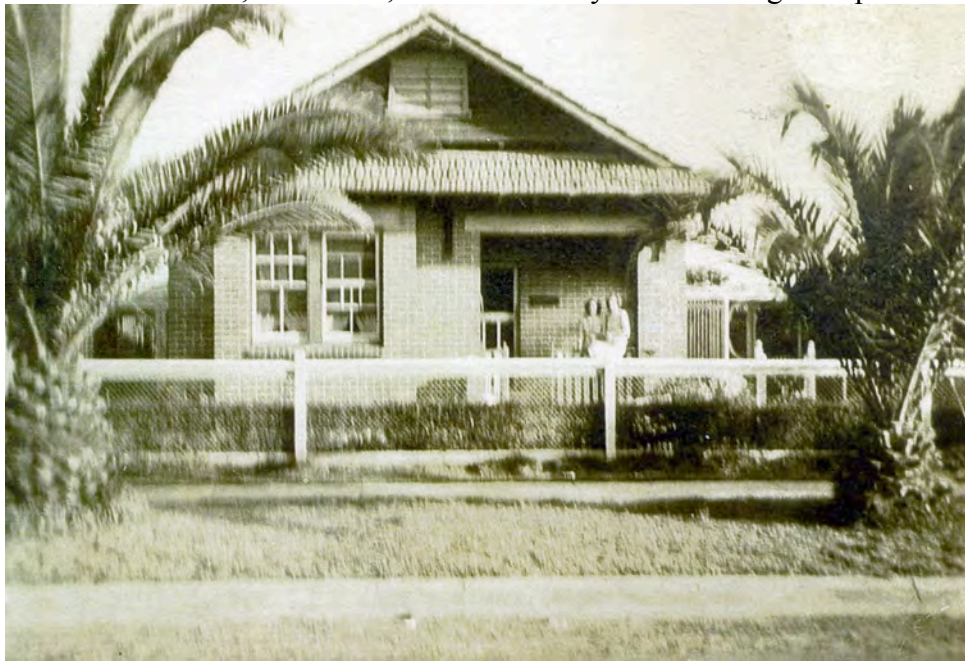

Before numbers were assigned to houses, everyone named his house. I have made a list of those used but only one, Caledonia, has lasted. This house is now owned by the de Meur family who have enlarged their house but with great sensitivity and kept the name.

MRS JOYCE McMILLAN Later that afternoon we visited a vibrant, talented lady, Mrs Joyce McMillan at her villa in Padstow, where I enjoyed seeing her paintings, poems and copper-work. She gave us photographs and a copy of her reminiscences of her early life in Oatley.. and talked of her former home. (Extracts from these reminiscences were published in Oatley Writes ...A Souvenir of Oatley's 150th anniversary 1833-1983, p.45.) She was born in 1926 at the house, Caledonia, now no 33 Lloyd Street and grew up there.





SANDY AULD

Her father, Alexander, (Sandy) Auld, had migrated from Scotland. He



met another Scottish migrant, Mary and they married. Shortly after, the Great War of 1914-1919 began and he enlisted in the AIF, serving overseas.. This entitled him to a War Services Home. The Bill of Sale is dated August 1922 and in 1923 he moved his family to the house they named Caledonia. It is still so named. The debt to the War Services Home Commission was paid off as a rent of £1 a week.

The house was built of brick, the roof of unglazed tiles. It had two bedrooms so Joy and her sister shared one, her brother, Hughie, slept on the verandah. Sandy added a verandah room at the rear and a fernery at the side.

The front fence consisted of one board, so low that cows could step over it, so most families added a four-foot rail to keep the bovines at bay.

Sandy lived in his War Service home till his death at the age of 65, Mary till the loss of a leg to diabetes meant she could not live alone. The 1929 Rate Book of Hurstville Council lists the house, Caledonia, as Lot 92 and valued at £800.

The house was sold to Mr Peter de Meur in 1978 and the family still live there. They enlarged the house to suit their needs, as they had 4 children. It a charming residence but is still recognizable as a War Service home.

CECIL JAMES BELCHER The last house in the section we are considering is no 43. It is weatherboard, painted white and Mrs Betty Belcher lives there. Her father-in-law, Cecil James Belcher, obtained the house as his War Service home in 1927. He had served in the British army but joined the AIF. Mr Belcher had 3 daughter and 2 sons. One son, Harold, was born in the house. He later married a local girl, Betty , and they continued to live in no 43.



The Hurstville Rate Book for 1929 lists C.J.Belcher Lot 97 living in a cottage valued at £775 and in a War Services home.

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Joy (Auld) McMillan provided a list of all the residents who lived on both sides of Lloyd Street, dated probably at about 1940. (Lists from Sands Directory of Sydney are provided for 1923, 1925, 1927, 1929.)

BUS SERVICE REG LAWLER According to Joy's list, at no 21, (Lot 86) lived Reg Lawler who ran the first bus service in Oatley West. The 20-seater ran from Mortdale Station to the corner of Lloyd and Short Streets. Victor Reginald Lawler was a late comer to Lloyd street. Lot 86 had been held by Alexander Gunn in 1923, and in 1925 by William Jones. I believe Reg came in 1931. (He had begun in 1923 with a bus run from Rockdale to Tom Ugly's Point and lived at various addresses in Kogarah.) I found it difficult to pinpoint Lawler's address. The

electoral rolls of 1933-5 show Victor Reginald and Lillian Lawler living at 50 Lloyd Street, which would put him in the block after Short Street, running down hill to the Park, not on the land purchased by the War Service Homes Commission. Reg and Lillian Lawler had 2 sons and 1 daughter. Their second son, Les, served in the Australian Navy on the corvette HMAS Pirie from 1943 to 1946. Although he survived, he was to die in 2002 from the effects of the asbestos dust used in the ships.

STEVE ROBERTS Next door in no 23, lived Steve Roberts, who worked on the bus as conductor. Steve later took over the route when Lawler transferred to a different route and lived in Algernon Street, Oatley.. where Reg died on 12 June 1957 at the age of 69.

Alec Leach wrote about the Buses of Oatley in 1996 and I particularly liked the story of Picture Night on Tuesdays during the war years. Reg would collect and deliver the audience to the Radio Theatre in Letitia Street, then nip over to Lloyd Street to play cards with his mates, and return in time to pick up the patrons at the end of the show.

DUCKWORTH At no 25 (lot 88) by 1929 J. Duckworth was living. Mrs Duckworth was 90 at the time of Oatley's 150th Anniversary in 1983. She reminisced about coming here from Newtown and finding cows jumped over one's front fence! "She remembers often walking to Hurstville to do the shopping on Friday nights. She pushed a pram all the way. Diment's Store was a big attraction. Mr Lawler, the bus driver, would take a group to Mortdale to the pictures if they wanted an outing."

HARRY THOMAS In no 37 (lot 94) from 1926, lived Harry Thomas,. Did his son, Neville Thomas and his wife, Gladys, live on in the house? Norm and Beryl Butters were

friends of Neville. When he was leaving his home for a nursing home in Gerringong, he gave them two pretty painted china plated (handwork of his wife) These were prizes at our Heritage Group's party on 2015.

OTHER WAR SERVICE HOMES

Lloyd Street was not the only site where the War Service Homes Commission bought land. I did not find any neat list of the purchases in the archives! But I found sites in nearby Myall Street and Mulga Street, purchased on January 18, 1921. One of those returned soldiers was Walter Lancelot Oscar Mallard, who was awarded the Military Cross.

Throughout 2015 we celebrated those young Australians who fought at Gallipoli and later in France and several made their homes in Oatley after their return to their homeland.
